“THE INN BETWEEN”

Kim Correa earned a BA from the University of Arizona in Economics in 1987 at the dawn of the computer era began a career in information technology sales and marketing. In 2003, she switched gears to nonprofit management, and entered the nonprofit healthcare sector in 2012 when she joined Community Nursing Services as their Development Director. This work led her to become involved with a committee of people who were trying to form a hospice for the homeless. She took a leadership role in 2014, formed The INN Between nonprofit entity, became its founding Executive Director and opened the agency in August of 2015 with 16 beds in the former Catholic convent on Goshen street. In 2018, The INN Between moved to a larger facility and now operates 50 beds. The INN Between is Utah's only provider of hospice and medical respite housing for people



“No One Dies Alone” is a volunteer program that provides the reassuring presence of a volunteer companion to dying patients who would otherwise be alone. Brian Zenger is a current MD/PhD student at the University of Utah studying Biomedical Engineering. Brian became involved with the death and dying community during medical school as a founding volunteer coordinator for the No One Dies Alone Program at University of Utah Health. He has grown and expanded his role to NODA (No One Dies Alone) Co-Director and has become more active throughout the community. Brian hopes to use the skills, ideas, and presence he has learned through his work with NODA as he develops into a practicing physician scientist.

Welfare Square is a complex in downtown Salt Lake City, Utah owned and operated by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, to provide material assistance to poor and otherwise needy individuals and families. It is part of the Church's Welfare System, and includes a 178-foot, 300,000 bushel grain silo, fruit orchards, a milk-processing plant that also makes cheese, a cannery, a bakery, a Deseret Industries thrift store, a private employment office, and the LDS Church's largest Bishop's storehouse, as well as associated administrative offices. The demand on the welfare system has risen significantly, due to the downturn in the U.S. economy, but according to Dennis Lifferth, Church director of Welfare Services, the system is well-equipped to handle the increasing needs of individuals encountering financial, unemployment or other difficulties.
