Scripture Readings:

Is 43: 16-21 SEE I AM MAKING SOMETHING NEW!

Ps 126: 1-6 BE FILLED WITH JOY FOR GOD HAS DONE GREAT THINGS

Phil 3: 8-14 CONTINUE TOWARD THE PRIZE GOD OFFERS YOU!

Jn 8: 1-11 GO, AND SIN NO MORE!

Reflection:

Lent comes to us in springtime. As our days lengthen, as winter turns into spring, as the earth spins on its axis toward the sun, we think about the ways we must turn away from sin and toward our God who invites us to turn toward him. We have arrived at the 5th Sunday of Lent.

In the Gospel reading for today, Jesus gets to the heart of turning oneself towards God. How easy it is to use the LAW to condemn someone else when we know that we are not without sin ourselves. We are all good people but Jesus invites us to examine the depths of our souls and find those sinful aspects of our selves that need to be washed in God's mercy.

- ✓ Try to put yourself in the woman's place: What were her feelings at that moment?
- ✓ Now put yourself in the place of those who were judging the woman caught in adultery? What were their feelings at that moment?

Prayer: Loving God, as I enter into this fourth week of Lent, renew in me the desire to turn myself toward you and see with fresh eyes both the goodness and the limitations that make up who I am. You wish to make all things new and while I desire to follow you, I sometimes hold back to make myself new and fresh. Give me new insights into what I really am before you. Give me a generous and willing heart during these remaining days of Lent to deepen my relationship with you. I ask this in Jesus Name. Amen.

Although I am filled with powerlessness and reasons for humiliation ...
